JULY 3RD FIREWORKS AND BIKE PARADE

BHA board members are hard at work fundraising for the fireworks. The show costs over \$15,000 and is funded solely by donations.



FIREWORKS We rely on donations from local businesses and community members to cover the cost of the fireworks, security, and signage. To keep it local, we don't promote it outside Boston Harbor, so your donations are what make it happen.

The fireworks show was started to create a central neighborhood event to replace street fireworks and the noise and fire danger that came with them. If you watch the show, or host a party for friends, please donate! Many neighbors have raised concerns about the cost of the fireworks, safety, and the impact on veterans, animals, and the environment. Does it still make sense? Might there be an alternative? We'll have a community discussion about this in the fall.

BIKE PARADE! Planning is underway for the July 3rd bike parade. Last year many kids participated and it was a blast!

All participants must sign a waiver, either at the event or downloaded from the Boston Harbor Association website, signed, and brought to the event.



The parade starts at 10:00 AM at the corner of Commercial Street and 73rd. Decorations will be provided so come early and decorate your child's bike. Stay afterward for ice cream treats provided by the Marina.

NEIGHBORS, COUNTY TEAM UP FOR EARTH DAY





At our annual Earth Day work party, over 30 neighbors filled two large truckloads with invasive English ivy, and another with green waste from the Butterfly and Memorial Gardens at Burfoot Park. We also planted a hundred native plants! These were donated by Puget Sound Plants, a local nursery.

Our County Commissioner, Carolina Mejia and Parks staff Ed Marson and Brent Murphy, joined us to recognize the volunteers and tour the areas we've successfully cleared of ivy and replanted. We also celebrated Burfoot Park's 50th birthday with desserts baked by neighbors and snacks donated by Fred Meyer.

SAVING OUR SIGN AND SEWER SCREEN

The .07 parcel of land where our "Welcome to Boston Harbor" sign is posted was nearly sold by the county for \$2,600 in February. This parcel also screens the sewer plant from view as we drive into the neighborhood. Quick intervention by neighbors stopped this sale. We tried to purchase it but because more than one party is now interested, it's slated for auction.

The Association's Environment Committee and Utility Advisory Committee (UAC) representatives, David Hartley and Jeff Nejedly, are advocating for the county Public Works to aquire the parcel and keep it wooded. ABOUT WATER AND WASTE

County Public Works held an Open House at BH School 4/22 to tell us about upcoming improvements to our water and sewer systems.

From Public Works webpage:

Updating Old Water Main: We're replacing around 6,000 feet—that's more than a mile—of water main that has been in the ground for decades. By updating these pipes, we're making sure that the water coming to your taps is cleaner and arrives without interruption.

Making Sewer Systems Better: Our sewer system is getting a boost, too. We're upgrading the STEP tanks involved in the early stages of cleaning the water that goes down our drains and toilets. These upgrades will make our sewer system more dependable and enhance the quality of water treatment, helping to keep our environment clean.
