"NNO" FUN WITH NEIGHBORS AND FIRE FIGHTERS

Spearheaded by Board Members Jackie Ashley and Larissa James, we held our first National Night Out event on August 6. Several neighbors walked over to the table set up at the corner of Boston Harbor Rd and 73rd Ave to get to know each other and talk with members of South Bay Fire Department about safety issues.

National Night Out was started in 1984 to increase awareness about police programs in communities, such as drug prevention and Neighborhood Watch, and to improve relationships with law enforcement. Forty years later, it still serves this purpose but it's also an opportunity for neighbors to come out and meet new neighbors or catch up with old ones.

WATER CONSERVATION AND SYSTEM UPGRADES

During the early July heat wave, Public Works informed us that water levels in our reservoir fell to 79 feet from the norm of 86-89 feet. It's important to keep the reservoir above 80 feet to ensure enough water to respond to fires. Public Works asked us to conserve water and gave us some ways to do it, and we did! Our efforts brought the level back up to around 84 feet. Well done Boston Harborites!

Conserving water, or not wasting it, is always a good idea so here are their suggestions again:

- 1. Water lawns less and only during early morning or late evening.
- 2. Fix any leaks in faucets, toilets, or irrigation systems.
- 3. Limit water use for non-essential purposes like car washing.
- 4. Use water-efficient appliances and fixtures

In other utility news, the County submitted their annual Water Use Efficiency Report to the Department of Health in June. From June '23 to June '24, leakage in our water system was calculated at 7.9%. The actual leakage or waste is likely less because the measure includes unmetered use through fire hydrants or other unmetered uses (like watering the new native plants at Burfoot! Ssshhh).

To help reduce water leakage, the County will be replacing a number of older water lines in the Boston Harbor service area. This work is funded through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) and will be completed in spring/summer of 2025.

In addition to these improvements to the water system, improvements will be made to the Boston Harbor sewer system to reduce infiltration and inflow into some of our STEP (septic tank effluent pump) tanks. This work is scheduled for summer of 2025.

IVY PULLING STARTS OCTOBER 20, 10 AM – 12 PM



Cooler weather and rain loosening up the soil means we can start pulling ivy again (I hear you – Oh goody!). We have made significant progress over the last couple years. Let's keep going! <u>West Bay Woods</u> in Olympia, <u>Madrona Woods</u> in Seattle, and Forest Park in Portland show that parks can be cleared of ivy and other invasives. They are great inspiration!

UPDATE ON SEWER SCREEN, BURFOOT PARK

It's official – on August 20th, the county commissioners approved Public Work's purchase of the .07 parcel next to the sewer plant! Thank you to everyone who wrote letters and attended meetings to make this happen.

In the June newsletter, we asked for your input on a proposal to expand Burfoot Park into the 8 acres owned by the County north of the park. We received comments from 35 households. You can see them <u>here</u>. On September 10, we sent the <u>proposal</u> and these comments (anonymously) to the Board of County Commissioners.
