




SBFD 8 - Target Levels of Service (TLoS)



Forthcoming improvement projects and their impact on Boston Harbor residents

1.1. Sewer Inflow and Infiltration Control (Step tank sealing)

The purpose of this work is to rehabilitate existing STEP tanks and reduce infiltration and inflow (I/I). Construction of the ARPA-funded STEP tank rehabilitations will begin March 31 of 2025.

1.2. Water Line replacements

The purpose of this work is to replace older, undersized water main with new larger water main, installed to current standards.

Construction of the ARPA-funded water main replacements will begin March 31 of 2025.

1.3. Planned improvements to water supply pumps and plumbing

Thurston County Public Works has designed improvements to Boston Harbor Well No. 5 and Well No. 6 to increase source capacity. This project will be constructed once funding becomes available.

Potential for future additional water and sewer connections

2.1. Physical constraints and opportunities to expand water and sewer system capacity

The water system is limited by source capacity.

The sewer system capacity is limited by inflow and infiltration (I/I). Sewer capacity is also limited by the permitted capacity of the wastewater treatment plant.

2.2. Permitting and legal steps

Sewer Capacity

- 1. Address Infiltration and Inflow.
- 2. Engineering Report
- 3. BoCC Resolution 11407 would need to be rescinded or amended
- 4. Facility Re-permitting with DOE.

Water Capacity

- 1. Increase source capacity
- 2. BoCC Resolution 11407 would need to be rescinded or amended

3. Nitrogen treatment requirement (operational and facility impacts)

Thurston County has been complying with the Puget Sound Nutrient General Permit (expires in 2026). This permit requires nitrogen sampling and reporting. There is currently no permitted standard for nitrogen.

4.1. Current compared to previous year

2024 and 2025 rates were adopted in the 2024-2025 budget. 2025 rate adjustments will increase the typical water/sewer utility bill by 3.3%.

4.3. How consolidation has affected Boston Harbor utility rates

Utility consolidation has reduced the rate at which water and sewer utility rates will need to increase, relative to an unconsolidated utility.

County-Owned Parcels & POST Plan

On February 12th, the Board affirmed its position that no county-owned parcels will have their status or disposition changed without first coming back to the Board for review and approval.

As for the POST Plan, we recognize its importance and will be discussing funding options as part of this year's budget conversations. Your feedback on priorities will be valuable as we move forward.

Surplus Lands & Property Management Program

Regarding surplus lands, Public Works is finalizing the Property Management Program, which will provide a structured approach to managing county-owned properties. Once finalized, an e-brief will be sent to Commissioners, and I will make sure to share that information with you all as well.

Traffic Delays for Hazardous Tree Removal

Heads-up about an upcoming traffic delay due to the removal of a hazardous tree. This work is necessary for public safety and should only take one day to complete.

Q: Does the county have plans to extend Byron St NE through to Boston Harbor Road?

A: Public Works has no plans of extending Byron St NE. There is unopened R/W available to extend Byron St to Boston Harbor Rd if a connection was needed. There has been some talk in the past of a private developer making this connection. It would be a difficult connection to make because of the topography and wetlands.



BHA Annual Community Survey November 2024 Invitations to participate were sent via email 696 postcards were sent via US Mail 102 total qualified participants answered 14 questions

- As part of the 2024 BHA communications strategy the Board introduced the 1st of what will become the BHA Annual Survey. This survey allows the community to voice their thoughts in an informal but relevant way.
- It is important the Board has accurate email and mailing addresses, so survey reaches all households within the BHA boundaries.
- Awareness of most BHA activities is high, as is access to key communication channels such as the BHA Website, BHA Newsletter, and BHA Facebook group.

BHA Annual Community Survey

- All participants live or own in the Boston Harbor Community
- 78% lived in or owned property in Boston Harbor for more than 5 years
- 48% lived or owned for more than 15 years
- 70% visited the Boston Harbor Association website
- 48% visited the Boston Harbor Facebook Page
- 66% read the Boston Harbor Association Newsletter
