ANNUAL MEETING NEWS

Please see the <u>presentations</u> and <u>minutes</u> for complete info from speakers and on Association activities, budget, and plans.

We heard lots of news from our elected officials and County staff at the annual meeting on February 19th.

- Both the Sheriff's office and Fire District 8 (Fire and Emergency Medical Services) have increased staff which should reduce response times.
- Commissioner Mejia told us the Board of County Commissioners (BoCC) committed to retaining the parcels they own north of Burfoot Park to eventually expand the park, per our Burfoot Park Expansion proposal. Yay! The public needs to let the BoCC know that updating the POST Plan is a priority. More to come on how you can help with this.
- Karen Weiss, new Public Works Director, announced the County would be removing the hazardous tree at the entrance to the Marina. This work has been completed and it looks amazing! Thank you County Public Works!
- Major water and sewer upgrades will begin this month, including step tank sealing to reduce inflow and
 infiltration, water line replacements, and upgrades to water supply pumps and plumbing. These
 improvements might result in some additional water and sewer hook ups becoming available in a couple
 years. We'll also see our rates increase by 3.3% (the only bad news, but grateful for our good clean water
 and a wastewater treatment plant that keeps our ditches free of sewage. It wasn't always this way.)

One of the biggest announcements at the meeting was the cancellation of the July 3rd Fireworks this year. The event has grown too large for the Marina and Association to manage, and the safety risks and costs have become prohibitive. The increase from 200 to over 500 boats alone was enough to overwhelm what was originally intended to be a small community Fireworks show.

But don't despair! An alternative celebration will happen on July 3rd after the bike parade. Stay tuned!

Members also voted on potential new community activities. The top three activities were: block party, weekly walk the loop, and a fun run. If you would like to help organize one of these events, please send an email to bha.wa.board@gmail.com

Two questions came up:

Is the County planning to extend Byron Rd to Boston Harbor Rd? No.

What's the status of the cell tower on Zangle Rd at Boston Harbor Rd? It's permitted, partially erected, and we don't know when it will be operational.

We said goodbye and thanked board member Nina Goodrich and voted in two new board members, Ed Steinweg and Mindy Atkinson. Jackie Ashley was re-elected. Welcome and thank you for volunteering!

HARBOR STORIES MARCH 8, AND NEXT UP APRIL 5

On March 8th, seventy people gathered at the Marina to hear from long-time Boston Harbor families, some who arrived as early as 1904. That was the Drehmel-Townsend family. According to Georgie Townsend, a great-great granddaughter of the Drehmel's, they built homes on land between 75th and 76th Ave (see picture). Georgie was joined by Julie Hayes and Jen Heldreth, granddaughters of the Hayes family who bought property south of the light house in 1934; Lance Campbell and his sister Shelley Mortvedt of the lighthouse property (1956); John Kerr, whose parents bought their house on the water for \$4800 (+ \$10 for the furnishings) in 1946; Mike DeFord, who still lives in his childhood home on Grainger Beach (1959) along 77th; and a surprise guest, Tim Livingston, whose family settled here in 1956. They had 14 kids in a one bathroom (!) house on Zangle Cove.
